Course Description:

The course is designed to provide an educational vehicle for understanding entrepreneurial thinking and practice. It gives introduction to the process of turning ideas into a successful start-up enterprise. Special emphasis on innovations derived from research and technology development. Students will be exposed to what entrepreneurship takes in a start-up context, and how integrate execution can be successfully utilized in a variety of career and work contexts. There will be a special effort to define key areas which an entrepreneur should be aware of, and to provide a framework of “toolkit” resources relevant to start-up execution. Students draft a business plan related to a business of own interest, using all available tools, techniques, and experience.
