Catalog description

This course is an overview of the development of Western culture from prehistoric times to the present. We will explore the visual arts and architecture as representative of cultural change and will examine developments in Western thought including the development of the scientific method, changing views of physical reality, and the redefinition of social justice. Lastly, we will consider the possibility that a "world culture" is developing in the post-industrial world. (3 units).

Course Objectives

This course is designed to equip students with the knowledge needed to understand a complex yet inspiring world of culture. This includes investigation of the history of art, literature, and architecture. We will try to illuminate the important role which culture plays in the development of human civilization. In order to achieve this goal, we will have to enrich our visual, literary, and architectural vocabulary as well as investigate the historical, social, and economic context of artistic creations. Through the discussion of art, architecture, and literature we will be able to take a close look at the evolution of western civilization, people's thoughts about the world and themselves.

Upon completion of the course students will be able to:

- Understand various works of western art, architecture, and literature from different historical periods.
- Discuss the differences between major western cultural eras and philosophies.
- Identify major historical, economic, and social factors that influenced the evolution of artistic expression.

• Appreciate human culture in all its complexity and diversity.

Procedures and methodology

The lecture method is combined with in-class discussions and student presentations, case studies and home assignments of various kinds. Core concepts identified from the textbook will be augmented with supplementary sources (made available to students on the class website) and applied to the real life situations during class activities.

Class Rules

- 1) **Class attendance** is required.
- 2) Administrative Policies on class absences:
 - a) A student receives a warning notice after missing 20% of class meetings.
 - b) A student is placed on probation after missing 30% of class meetings.

Course Project

At the conclusion of the course, every student must complete a research project for an inclass presentation. Specific format and research topics will be determined later and discussed in class. Research projects must comply with the Lincoln University guidelines.

Each student will present three power point slide presentations to the class. Each presentation will include approximately 5 slides that will discuss a topic of the student's choice from each of the three main historical periods discussed in this course- the Greek/Roman world, the Renaissance, and the Modern Period.
