CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

The course covers basic economic relationships, demand and supply analysis, forecasting, production and cost theories, market structures and models, pricing practices, capital budgeting and governmental regulations. (3 units)

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Students to understand the concept, goal, scope, and fundamentals of managerial economics.
- Students to understand the extent of managerial economics in the global economy environment.
- Students to understand the application of managerial economics in real business environment.
- Students to understand the advanced approaches and the trends in microeconomic analysis for decision making.
- Students to understand the specifics of global environment and its impact on management.

ATTENDANCE:

BA301 is an online course. However, students are expected to attend each class session. If you cannot attend class due to a valid reason, please notify the instructor prior to the class.

EXAMS:

Assignments, midterm, and final examinations consist of theoretical and empirical questions and are structured in the form of written essays or analytical solutions that provide concise answers to mathematical problems. Each exam would include four questions. The essays must be written clearly and easy to read, structurally with a clear logical presentation of the answers. Graphs, charts, tables, and other supporting illustrations are required if needed. Examples to illustrate the answers are required. The exams are neither "open book" nor "open notes." The final exam is comprehensive. Cheating in exam results in immediate termination of the exam, grade "F" with ZERO points, and report to the Dean of Business Studies.

All activities will be graded according to the points as shown below.

In exams, every answer is graded by points from 0 to 100 and the total points for an exam are calculated as the average of the points received for all answers in the exam.
