COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to the principles and concepts of computer science and its applications. Discussions focus on the use of computers in business and personal lives, computer system basics, computer architecture, hardware, systems and applications software, programming languages, software engineering, data communications, information systems, the history of computing and computer's impact on society. Introduction to the Internet and online information sources. Laboratory on use of computer hardware and software. This class includes 15 hours of independent lab work. (3 units)

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Students will learn about the latest available computer and the Internet technologies, practice the use of the Microsoft Windows operating systems, business applications in the Microsoft Office 2003 package, and the use of the Internet applications and resources.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS:

Lecture method is used in combination with the practical use of the Internet and business software. The emphasis will be on learning by doing. Every student must participate in an intensive classroom activity. Reading, writing, and computer assignments will be made throughout the course.

Additional assignments based on the Internet and library resources can be given during the semester. Take a folder and create a Project Notebook. You will put in this folder printouts of the results of all your assignments and storage media (floppy disk / CD disc / DVD disc / USB flash drive) with your assignments stored on it. The instructor can ask you to turn in this folder and grade your laboratory work at any time during the semester.
